

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Kyoto: Mecca for Japanese Buddhism

There's an old Japanese saying that goes "See Kyoto before one dies..." To those who have never visited there, I'd adapt portions of that well-founded advise and say see Kyoto before you leave Japan, it's well worth it.

To understand the underlying meaning of the opening quote to the Japanese is to understand the importance of Kyoto and its surrounding area to the Japanese people. First of all, Kyoto is full of deep religious significance by being the Mecca of Buddhism in Japan.

Zen Buddhism became prominent in Japan towards the end of the 12th century, and as a result, the "Five Great Temples" were built in Kyoto. From this beginning sprang 1600 additional Buddhist temples, 30 of which are the headquarters of different sects.

Kyoto was also once the site of the military rulers of Japan, the Shoguns, who for many centuries overshadowed the religious rulers, the Emperors, in guiding the nation's destiny.

Kyoto's history dates back 1,200 years, when Emperor Kammu moved his court and government to the city in 794 A.D. During the 450 years following that move Kyoto became the national center of politics, learning, religion and art.

At the beginning of the 17th century, the Tokugawa regime moved its political center from Kyoto to what is today called Tokyo. However Kyoto, remained the home of the Emperor and his court until 1868 and continued to grow in its own unique way.

With the plans of its streets and boulevards still virtually unchanged


from those of the 17th century, Kyoto today is Japan's fifth largest city and the center of Japan's tourist

One of the more impressive points of interest to those visiting the city is probably the Nijo Castle. Built in 1603 by the first Tokugawa Shogun as a temporary residence while visiting Kyoto, its buildings and surrounding 70 acres are today listed as national treasures.

The works of art that grace the buildings are in themselves tourist attractions. On entering the Chinese gate leading to the first building, one sees the exquisite wooden carvings and beautiful metal work. It's outer panels have carved flowers and butterflies while the inner ones have an imaginary lion in a playful mood and a tiger fighting a dragon, said to be symbolic of the shogun's power against the feudal lords who passed through the gate to honor the shogun.

The entire floor of the shogun's living quarters is built in such a way, either purposely or otherwise, as to produce a "nightingale" effect which makes a singing sound when walked upon. It is said that this was done to warn the shogun against intruders and thus prevent his assassination.

Another point of interest in the "Sanjusangen-Do" or Hall of 33 Ken, so called because of the 33 spaces between the front pillars, is in fact a long Buddhist temple which holds the 1,001 images of the Goddess Kwannon. Besides these images, the hall holds other old items of rare artistic value. The hall is located in the eastern district of Kvoto, about a 15 min. walk from Kyoto Station.

service was made to end duplication and improve military postal operations, according to the officials. The DoD action provides for the first time, coordinated funding of the more than \$120 million spent each year for overseas mail.

Joint military mail activities, according to an Army official, will be located with U.S. Postal Service (USPS) Centers in New York and San Francisco. These activities will provide routing information to USPS on military mail, to include mail going to Army post offices like Miami and Seattle.

Officials say the MPSA headquarters and the joint mail activities will be staffed by all the military services. The MPSA will provide a central point of contact for the USPS and make military mail service procedures standard.



Friendship Day Photo Contest Winners


















Third place in the color category was taken by Lance Corporal Todd Smith of H&MS-15, with a Minolta SR-T 202 35mm on Fuji color film.
