



Tsuyu...an unavoidable season in Japan

efore the summer heat scorches everything, Japan experiences an extra season called "tsuyu" or "baiu", or rainy season. It's a most unpleasant and gloomy period of time. Except for Hokkaido, most of Japan is gradually covered with a month-long seasonal rain front which is expected to continue until mid-July.

A local meteorological observatory recently released June's weather forecast for Chugoku District, the southern part of the Japanese archipelago. At the beginning of June, a migratory anti-cyclone is sometimes overcast and fair weather will possibly last. However, in mid-June, a seasonal front will remain, and there will be more cloudy or rainy days. The temperature and precipitation will possibly be the same as an average year. In late-June, a seasonal front will be so active, that the rainy days will look like they will last. There will be a great deal of rain.

During tsuyu, rain falls persistently. The air is very humid, registering more than 80 percent of humidity, and everything is saturated in moisture.

However, it's the most important time to fill paddy fields with sufficient water and to plant rice. The amount of rain controls the food supply for the rest of the year.

A colorful, massive flower..."ajisai" or hydrangea is a kind of symbolic flower during tsuyu. It enlightens people's low spirits during this season.

It's also a time for Japanese housewives to fix plum pickles or plum wine. The plum is considered to have medicinal value and is good for soothing the stomach.

Although this rainy season may make you feel uncomfortable or gloomy, it's very necessary for man and crops to survive the hot and dry summer season. Ħ




Ajisai is a colorful and massive flower...also a symbolic flower of rainy season.


Most teens said they also liked going to Hiroshima.
